

EDITORIAL REVIEW PROCESS

The *Indian Journal of Law and Technology* follows a three-step review process for all submissions:

1. Two Editors of the Editorial Board will review each submission and either accept or reject the paper for further reviews. In case of a tie, the Chief Editor will also review the submission. Submissions may be preliminarily rejected without complete review if the topic does not fit the objectives of the journal as provided in the Guidelines for Authors. On acceptance, authors may receive suggestions from Editors on changes to be incorporated before subjecting the paper to mandatory peer review.
2. Two blind peer-reviewers with expertise in the subject matter will provide detailed feedback on submissions that have cleared the first stage of review. Publication in the Journal will be contingent on incorporating these changes within the given deadline.
3. One Line Editor will review the paper for citation, spelling and grammar errors with feedback on consistency in style and tone, which will be sent back to the Author for confirmation before going to print.

In the case of articles solicited by the Editorial Board, one or more of the above stages may be dispensed with on a case to case basis.
